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Dozens of Organizations across California Sign Letter Urging Legislators to Support Governor Brown's Revenue Proposals to Eliminate Ineffective Enterprise Zones and Require Single-Sales Factor Apportionment

Dear Speaker Pérez and Senate President pro Tem Steinberg:

On behalf of the undersigned health and human services organizations and the families who count on Medi-Cal, CalWORKS, IHSS, child care and other vital services, we thank you for your efforts to minimize more devastating cuts in the budget you sent to Conference Committee. We also urge you to support – at a minimum – the revenues needed to ensure California's low-income families, people with disabilities, abused and neglected children, working parents, seniors and others do not suffer more hardship.

As you know, California's low- and middle- income families started 2011 still reeling from the impact of the Great Recession. The weak recovery has left unemployment still well above 12%, with projections for weak job growth through 2012. Californians' average household income has fallen, and we expect 2010 data will show more even families fell into poverty over the past year.

Against this context, the deep budget cuts Governor Brown has proposed will be especially painful. The Governor has said that if California fails to raise revenues in an amount equal to the cuts, the pain will be much worse. Protecting the critical public structures low-income families are counting on in this time will require your leadership now more than ever.

Eliminating special tax breaks for large corporations that haven't delivered the jobs and economic growth they have promised are an obvious starting point. We urge you to support these revenues – at a minimum—in the FY 2011-12 budget:

1) Eliminating Enterprise Zone (EZ) Tax Breaks: The Public Policy Institute of California (PPIC) found that “California’s enterprise zone program – the state’s largest economic development program – has no statistically significant effect on employment.” An analysis by the California Budget Project found the vast majority of the breaks went to corporations with more than \$1 billion in assets. The Governor’s proposal to eliminate the EZ program and related tax breaks would save \$924 million this year and more than \$600 million per year thereafter.

2) Mandatory Single Sales Factor Apportionment: California and Missouri are the only states in the nation that currently allow multinational corporations to choose how their profits are taxed. The Governor’s proposal would require nearly all corporations to use a single formula based solely on the percentage of their sales that occur within California. This shift would generate an estimated \$468 million in 2010-11 and \$942 million in 2011-12. Corporations, as a whole, would still pay lower taxes than under the pre-2009 law.

Minimizing cuts to vital health and human services will require new revenues and a critical look at these tax loopholes and others which benefit large corporations but don't deliver the “bang for the buck” they promised. Your leadership is needed now more than ever to ensure California maintains the critical services and supports families need to avoid sliding backward into poverty.
